Let's create some definitions of common literacy terms.



# PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS

This is the ability to recognize and manipulate the spoken parts of words.

- syllables
- onset-rime
- phonemes





# PHONEMIC AWARENESS

This is the ability to identify and manipulate individual sounds (phonemes) in words.

- first sound
- middle sound
- last sound





### PHONICS

This is the method that teaches the relationship between the letters of the written language and the sounds of spoken language.

- learn letters and sounds spoken and written
- have conversations



## DECODING

This is the ability to apply your knowledge of letter-sound relationships, including the knowledge of letter patterns, to correctly pronounce words.

- long and short sounds of letters
- digraphs
- consonant blends



# FLUENCY

This is the ability to read a text quickly and correctly.

reading without blending (decoding)

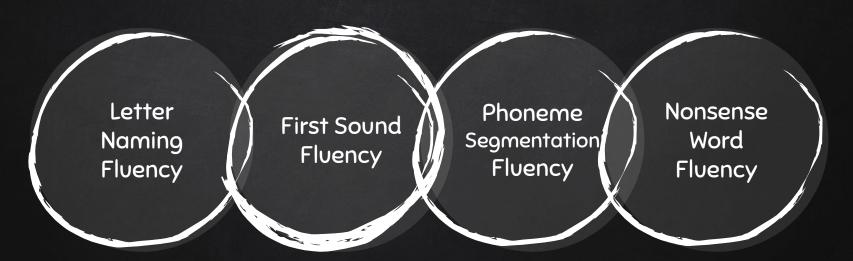


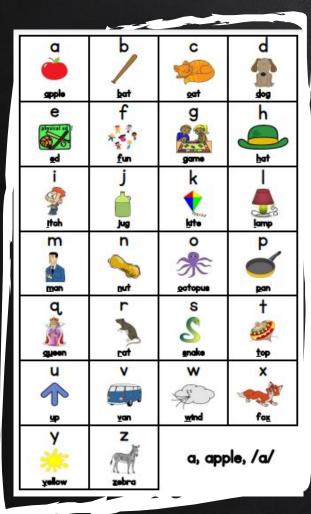
# How do we assess what your students are learning?

- X District wide 3 times per year



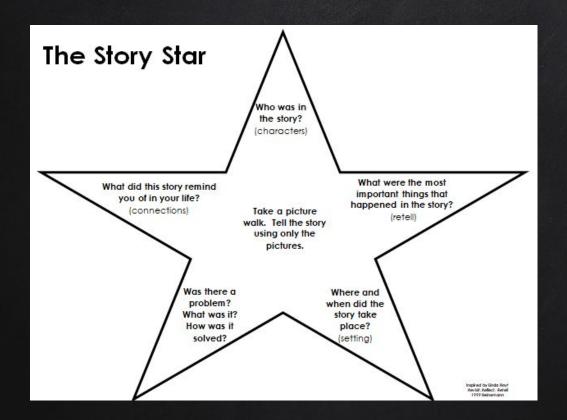




### HOW CAN YOU HELP AT HOME?
